## City of Richmond declares Beijing 8.8.08 Day

In case anyone feels left out of the Beijing Olympic experience, the City of Richmond has come up with a remedy.

On Thursday, Mayor Malcolm Brodie was expected to sign a proclamation declaring August 8, 2008 as Beijing 8.8.08 Day in Richmond to coincide with the opening of the 2008 Summer Olympics in Beijing that same day.

The proclamation will be signed a week in advance of a major event

held at Richmond's Aberdeen Centre when the community is invited for a free pancake breakfast, entertainment, and an opportunity to watch the opening ceremonies of the Beijing Games on a giant screen beginning – if you can set the alarm early enough - it begins at 5 a.m. The event is a result of a partnership between the Richmond Spirit of B.C. Committee, Legacies Now, Aberdeen Centre, the city and other businesses including the Richmond

According to city spokesperson Ted Townsend, the proclamation

is a result of a number of connections between Richmond and China. Among them, Richmond and Beijing are venue cities in consecutive Olympic Games as is Qingdao, one of Richmond's newest Chinese friendship cities.

"Of course there's a lot of cultural and economic ties between Richmond and China," said Townsend. "And so for all of those reasons, we are joining in supporting the celebration that will coincide with the opening of the games and looking forward to 2010 when we will be in the spotlight as an official

venue city."

According to a draft of the document, the proclamation is also in recognition that the community is committed to building its extensive and fruitful connections with Chinese peoples around the world and with fellow members of the Olympic family.

Accompanied by representatives from Aberdeen Centre, the Richmond Spirit of B.C. Committee, Legacies Now, and the Vice Consul of China, Brodie will sign the proclamation at 2:30 p.m. on Thursday in the atrium at City Hall.
